Pest reporting through Regional Plant Protection Organizations

In accordance with Article VIII.1(a) of the IPPC, Contracting Parties cooperate in the exchange of information on plant pests. CPs may also undertake their pest reporting through their RPPOs. Already in 2009 CPM-4 endorsed reporting through an RPPO. CPs need, however, to liaise with their RPPO first to ensure that they have a mechanism to allow pest reporting in this way.

Should a CP wish to provide pest reports through its RPPO, the CP needs to provide the Secretariat with a signed form notifying that they are using this possibility/option for reporting. The CP can withdraw from pest reporting through RPPO and continue reporting directly to the Secretariat. The Secretariat needs to be informed about this change. The form for contracting parties to provide legal authority to RPPOs to undertake pest reporting on their behalf is available on the IPP.

Regarding the current status of a possibility to pest report through RPPOs, the IPPC Secretariat has been working with EPPO for the past few years to create this mechanism and it is intended to have this completely operational (out of the pilot phase) in the next few months. The IPPC Secretariat has also been working more recently with PPPO on this issue and NAPPO will consider this in the second half of 2016.

Pest Reporting – general overview continued

NRO Prcedures adopted by CPM-11 in April 2016 following the recommendations of National Reporting Obligations Advisory Group:


- 1. Art. VIII 1(a) of the International Plant Protection Convention sets out that the reporting of pests will be undertaken "... in accordance with such procedures as may be established by the Commission ...". The responsibilities of and requirements for Contracting Parties in reporting the occurrence, outbreak and spread of pests in areas for which they are responsible are set out in ISPM No.17 "Pest reporting", as adopted by ICPM-4 in 2002.
- 2. All reporting requirements established under ISPM No.17 "Pest reporting" are fully met when pest reports are published through the International Phytosanitary Portal.
- 3. Pest reports can also be made through existing RPPOs on condition that a CP signs an appropriate form to satisfy the legality of that action and the technical mechanism exists for the exchange of such data.
- 4. A pest report should contain important information that allows Contracting Parties to adjust as necessary their phytosanitary import requirements and to take actions taking into account any changes in pest risk.
- 5. When in doubt as to the qualification of a pest as a "pest of immediate or potential danger" and therefore its reporting, the reporting of any pest is desirable.

Main constraints encountered by Contracting Parties in pest reporting:

- A large number of Contracting Parties do not have the capacity to undertake pest reporting in a sustainable manner.
- Political commitment to pest reporting is required. The awareness on this issue should be increased to achieve this goal.
- National surveillance systems need to be strengthened. Capacity development for surveillance and pest identification is needed for some Contracting Parties.
